Occasions when the Church is open for Mass

St. Teilo's will be open for Mass today at 10.00am. If you have not booked in advance and have not had verbal confirmation from Carole Burns – PLEASE DO NOT ATTEND.

St. Teilo's will also be open for Mass this week on Tuesday and Thursday at 10.00am and next Sunday at 10.00am. The booking arrangements are as usual and are outlined below.

The Bishops' Conference of England and Wales has confirmed that the obligation to attend Sunday Mass remains suspended. So please do not feel under any pressure to attend the Church when online or phone Masses are valid alternatives.

If you wish to attend Mass

- Booking will be by telephone on a 'first come, first served' basis. Carole Burns is the contact and can be telephoned on 07747 562847 **between 11am and 1pm on Monday, September 14th** for Mass on Tuesday, September 15th or Thursday, September 17th or Sunday, September 20th. PLEASE DO NOT RING OUTSIDE THESE HOURS.
- You **must** book if you wish to attend Mass. We do not want to turn people away at the door, so if you have not booked in advance – PLEASE DO NOT ATTEND.
- By registering to attend Mass, you confirm the following conditions are met:
 - You currently show no symptoms for Coronavirus.
 - Should you develop symptoms prior to the service, you will NOT attend.
 - You agree to use hand-sanitiser as a condition of entry.
- **Please note that, due to newly agreed Government regulations, Face Masks must be worn in Church from Monday, September 14th onwards.**
- It should be noted that there will be **no toilet facilities available**.
- You should arrive between 20 and 5 minutes before the start time of Mass.
- Please allow a Steward to show you to your seat.
- Please wait to be invited up to Holy Communion.
- Please refrain from talking to your friends who are not part of your household.
- No congregational singing is allowed at Mass and any responses should be made in a low tone, as singing and loud voices have been shown to spread the virus further.
- There will be no collection at Mass. You are encouraged to make your donation to the Church via standing order or online. If you wish to donate cash, please do so in the basket at the back of the Church, one of the wall boxes around the Church or in the votive candles box.

Please accept our apologies for any inconvenience or distress these regulations may cause. They are a requirement to enable public worship to take place.

First Holy Communion

The First Holy Communion Catechists have discussed how we might manage the group of children who began their First Holy Communion preparation just before lockdown. The Catechists believe that the best option is to start the programme again in the New Year and work towards a May First Holy Communion for both the existing candidates and those new candidates who will be eligible in 2021. The Catechists feel that with so much uncertainty at the present time and over the next few months, they did not want to restart and then have to suspend the programme again in the winter months. The Catechists hope and pray that things will be a bit more settled in the New Year and look forward to welcoming the children and their parents back to the programme.

Confirmation

The Confirmation catechist has also discussed the arrangements for the sacraments and is taking a similar approach to the First Communion Catechists, that is starting the programme again in the New Year and working towards Confirmation in May or June 2021 for both the existing candidates and those who have become eligible since lockdown. Detailed arrangements will be advertised in the Newsletter at the beginning of 2021.

Pilgrimage to Walsingham

Canon continues his pilgrimage to the English National Shrine to Our Lady at Walsingham until later this week. He has sent his best wishes from the shrine and says he is praying for all of us parishioners both at daily Mass and at the various devotions at the Shrine. Canon is saying Mass each day for the intentions advertised in the newsletter.

The Exaltation of the Holy Cross

The Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross is celebrated on Monday. The feast recalls three historical events: the finding of the True Cross by Saint Helena, the mother of the Emperor Constantine; the dedication of churches built by Constantine on the site of the Holy Sepulchre and Mount Calvary; and the restoration of the True Cross to Jerusalem by the Emperor Heraclius II. However, the deeper meaning of the feast is a celebration of the Cross as the instrument of our salvation. This instrument of torture, designed to degrade the worst of criminals, became the life-giving tree that reversed Adam's Original Sin when he ate from the Tree of the Knowledge of Good and Evil in the Garden of Eden.

Our Lady of Sorrows

On Tuesday, we celebrate the memoria of Our Lady of Sorrow, a much loved feast which reminds us of the suffering Mary underwent in doing the will of God in her life. The title, Our Lady of Sorrows, given to our Blessed Mother, focuses on her intense suffering and grief during the passion and death of our Lord. Traditionally, this suffering was not limited to the passion and death event. Rather, it comprised the Seven Dolors or Seven Sorrows of Mary, which were foretold by the Priest Simeon who proclaimed to Mary, "This child is destined to be the downfall and the rise of many in Israel, a sign that will be opposed and you yourself shall be pierced with a sword so that the thoughts of many hearts may be laid bare" (Luke 2:34-35).

The seven sorrows of our Blessed Mother included the flight of the Holy Family into Egypt; the loss and finding of the child Jesus in the Temple; Mary's meeting of Jesus on His way to Calvary; Mary's standing at the foot of the cross when our Lord was crucified; her holding of Jesus when He was taken down from the cross; and then our Lord's burial. In all, the prophecy of Simeon that a sword would pierce our Blessed Mother's heart was fulfilled in these events. For this reason, Mary is sometimes depicted with her heart exposed and with seven swords piercing it. More importantly, each new suffering was received with the courage, love and trust that echoed her fiat, her yes, let it be done unto me according to Thy Word, first uttered at the Annunciation.

St. Cornelius, Pope and Martyr and St. Cyprian, Bishop and Martyr

Wednesday is the memoria of St. Cornelius and St. Cyprian. St. Cornelius and St. Cyprian were friends and colleagues in life and both worked hard to preserve the unity of the Church in a period of great persecution both from the Roman Empire and from the heretic, Novatian. St. Cornelius and St. Cyprian encouraged each other to lead virtuous, self-sacrificing, and loving lives for God, both are remembered in the list of saints in the first Eucharistic Prayer.

St. Robert Bellarmine S.J.

Thursday is the memoria of St. Robert Bellarmine S.J. Bellarmine was born in 1542 and studied at the Universities of Padua and Leuven where he was the first Jesuit to teach. He became Rector of the Roman College, later renamed the Pontifical Gregorian University, in 1592 and was appointed a Cardinal in 1599. As a bishop, Bellarmine put into effect the reforming decrees of the Council of Trent and was an ardent advocate for the renewal of the faith, rather than the radical break from tradition represented by Luther and the other protesting theologians.

From his extensive theological research, Bellarmine wrote his best known works, Disputationes, which addressed the various religious controversies of the time. They considered such matters as the Word of God, of Christ and of the Pope; the authority of ecumenical councils and of the Church; the Sacraments, Divine Grace, free will, justification, and good works. Bellarmine wrote several short books intended to help ordinary people in their spiritual life, the most famous of which is called 'Jacob's Ladder' and explores how we reach up to God by responding to the grace of the Lord Jesus in our lives.

St. Januarius

Saturday sees the celebration of St. Januarius of Naples, a much beloved saint of the Italian people. Gennaro, as he is known in Italy, was Bishop of Benevento and was martyred during the great persecution of the Emperor Diocletian. He is perhaps best known due to the liquefaction of his blood, which takes place on his feast day each year. In normal times, the event would lead large numbers of people to gather in Naples Cathedral in his honour.

The Season of Creation

At the present time, the Church is celebrating the Season of Creation which began on Tuesday, September 1st and continues until Sunday October 4th – the Feast of St. Francis of Assisi. The Bishops' Conference of England and Wales has provided resources and a video of Pope Francis, as part of its encouragement for us all to celebrate this season, especially in a year when the whole world seems in turmoil. Since the beginning of the lockdown, I have tried to stay in touch by telephone with those people who are on our parish sick communion list. For those who live locally to the Church, I have, where possible, dropped off copies of the Catholic Universe to parishioners. Though I am aware that, with so many other things going on, this contact has not always been as regular as I would have liked. But I thank those with whom I have been in contact during this time for their thanks and concern.

As we are gradually moving back towards the 'new normal', Fr. Dwayne and I would like to make sure that no one who is housebound and unable to attend Mass is left out of contact with the Church. If you know of anyone who is unable to attend Mass or access the online Masses via a computer, tablet or mobile phone, please let me know as soon as possible. I have already asked the SVP, who do such valuable work in the parish, to share their list of contacts with me. I would like each of you as parishioners to think carefully about the Catholics who sat near you during Mass before the lockdown, or who live in your street or local community. We will, of course, respect the data protection of any names and contact details which are given to us. If you have names and contact details, please email whitchurch@rcadc.org.

We hope, when we have a complete list, to be able to ensure weekly phone contact with the people concerned and to post them a printed copy of the Parish Newsletter. It is vital at this time that we do not forget the sick and the housebound and ensure that we, as an active parish community, remain in contact with them. I would like to thank the SVP who have continued to support people, at a distance, over the last few months, and hope that others might be willing to give some help to print and post the newsletters or be involved in the telephone contact. If so, please let me know.

If you have any other ideas of ways you could help the sick and housebound safely, from your own home, please let me know, on the email address above. All ideas are welcome. Fr. Dwayne and I will do our best to support all the initiatives that are suggested. Many thanks in advance.

The donation button on the front page of the Parish website has been updated to take account of the change. You will notice some slight differences on the Virgin Money Giving page from the previous version but the main functions will operate just as before.

We have raised £115 in the first week of operation of the new page.

When we set up the original page at the start of the pandemic, it enabled us to provide an immediate solution to address the financial needs of the Parish. To speed the set up of the site, all the donations were directed to the Archdiocesan bank account and paid back to the Parish Account from the Archdiocese.

Now we have settled into using Virgin Money Giving and have some time to sort things out, we, along with the other parishes of the Archdiocese, have been able to set up a new page so that all donations come straight to the Parish bank account, rather than via Archbishop's House.

help us to forgive.


When someone gets on our nerves:
